

HAPPINESS WORKSHOP





Internship, Placement & Beyond

My internship at Rainbow Aviation Pvt. Ltd. assisted me in gaining practical exposure to aviation finance. From the start, I was working in real-time with financial data on real processes including Bank Reconciliation, Voucher Entry, GST and TDS tracking, and compiling financial statements. I had hands-on experience using systems like Tally, Priority, and Awery, and saw how financial information flows through the organization and compliance and accuracy are a critical part of the aviation industry. I gleaned not only technical knowledge, but also I attended workshops, learned from finance leaders, and experienced their perceptions of financial strategy and regulations. Most importantly I was reminded how soft skills like communication, time management, and teamwork are all important in a real life experience. My educational foundation of finance helped me facilitate myself into all professional tasks. All in all, my internship was a building block of experience that gave me information about aviation finance practices, provided me with the confidence to explore a career with finance within the aviation sector.

My 14-week SIP with Kirloskar Oil Engines Limited (KOEL), a manufacturer of engines and power solutions, provided me with significant exposure to global business and finance functions. I was a finance intern in the B2B International Business Group (IBG) and began a project titled "Study on Working Capital Management and its Impact on Financial Performance". My main tasks centered around the project, including conducting analysis on the aging of inventory for Kirloskar Americas Corporation, creating processes to enable the business to manage inventory effectively, and validating the IBG customer master database with assistance from teams across functions. I also examined the terms extended to customers with respect to payment, provided ideas for speeding up cash collection, and developed a template to automate reporting of profitability from customers based on reconciled customer sales and cost information. I used the experience to develop my analytical and problem-solving skills, as well as learn the more subtle aspects of business processes and finance. It also allowed me to examine the international business landscape, and the role that speed and collaboration play in generating results. It was beneficial to engage with experienced professionals. I was able to move from theoretical discussions in academics, to applied solutions to practical business issues, while at the same time, moving along some linear continuum of technical proficiency in Excel and other systems.

During my summer internship at Dream Plast India Pvt. Ltd., I worked on the project Optimizing Financial Operations, A Study on Banking, Receivable Payable Management, and Cash Flow, which allowed me to explore practical financial processes beyond textbook learning. I worked closely with the finance department during my 13 week internship, handling banking tasks like international inbound remittances and vendor payments through the HSBC and ICICI bank portals. I learned how to balance accounts using Bank Reconciliation Statements at Finsys ERP, where I also took part in statutory compliance duties like ESIC, EPF, and TDS filings. I witnessed directly how ERP systems increase productivity and decrease human error, underscoring the need of automation in the financial industry. Furthermore, controlling process delays without sacrificing quality improved my managerial abilities. This internship strengthened my financial knowledge, improved my confidence with ERP systems and compliance processes, gave me practical experience to support my future in finance.

I worked as an intern at SysTools Software Pvt Ltd last summer. The company specializes in software for digital forensics, cybersecurity, and data privacy. My project included using social media marketing principles to encourage better customer engagement. I focused on one organization's LinkedIn account, not as a user, but as a strategy. I used creative tools like Canva, to develop content calendars, posts, graphics, captions and track engagement for both posts and pages. I learned that engaging audiences depends on the format and wording of the content even very minor changes in format or even wording can dramatically increase audience engagement. I enjoyed taking complicated and technical subject matter like cybersecurity and changing it into low hanging shareable, sometimes humorous, content. My favorite part of the entire experience was being named Employee of the Month. I was proud that they recognized me, I felt a little bashful, and the event really improved my confidence. I improved my planning processes and considering how to communicate with an audience. In addition to learning a few other skills, I realized that I do enjoy the creative sub-discipline of marketing. 


THE HIDDEN HINDU


